In Language Arts we continue working in our guided reading groups. I am seeing students finding different genres of books that they are enjoying and I'm also seeing lots of strategies being used to figure out tricky words or check for understanding. I am so proud of these grade 3s!

We have been writing paragraphs, complete with a topic sentence, supporting reasons and a concluding sentence. Students have been exploring writing with different sentence starters as well as creating sentences of varying lengths, by including conjunctions to make them more complex. I am very impressed with how the students have been working so hard to learn about paragraphs! Next, we will be writing persuasive speeches and sharing opinions. I can't wait to see the finished pieces for this unit!



We are completing our multiplication unit and students have been working so hard to practice their facts to 5 X 5. Thank you so much to families who are helping their children practice their facts to gain confidence and achieve mastery in their times tables. Some students have even asked for extra practice work to do over the Easter break! YAY!

Our next science unit is building things and our social studies unit has us learning about the Ukraine.

Grade 4 News

Our reading strategy for April and May is evaluating. What is evaluating? It is a strategy readers use to form opinions about information the author presents in a text. Readers confirm or adjust their views as new information is introduced and discussed.

We are finishing a hilarious shared novel called "Skinny Bones" this month and will then transition into small leveled guided reading groups. Our read aloud is "City of Ember", an underground city that is about to run out of food and electricity. Can a young girl and boy save Ember?

Grade fours continue to write informative essays. Children are now writing five paragraph pieces including an introduction, conclusion and three supporting ideas. We will also work on script writing for a shadow puppet theatre.

In Math, children will work on the concept of area and perimeter and will then construct and interpret pictographs and bar graphs to draw conclusions.

PLEASE PRACTISE TIMES TABLE FACTS WITH YOUR CHILD UNTIL THEY ARE FAST AND ACCURATE.

In Science, we are finishing Lights and Shadows and will shift into Social Studies to learn about the Boreal Forest region of Alberta.

Grade 5M News

For the month of April our focus reading comprehension strategies will be Making Connections and Inferring. Students have had the chance to read some short stories in their levelled guided reading groups and the class is now doing independent reading projects based on a variety of fractured fairy tales. Each student chose their own short story or novel to read independently. As a class we will continue to discuss the characteristics of fractured fairy tales while we compare these new versions to the class fairy tales. We will continue with our writing unit, Literary Essays, by writing essays about the books we are reading and will complete the unit by writing a compare and contrast essay about our fractured fairy tale and the classic version it is based off of.

At the end of March our class completed our review of decimals with a focus on representing decimal numbers in many ways (expanded form, word form, standard form, ect.). Next we will shift our focus to fractions and begin creating equivalent fractions.

Our Weather Watch unit is science is moving along and we have already learned a bit about temperature, the movement of air, humidity, and types of precipitation. We are lucky to have a Scientists in Schools presentation booked for April 17th so we can continue to learn about different weather phenomenon.

In social we will be wrapping up our look at the physical regions of Canada and the many people who have called the area their home with our First Nations inquiry projects. Each student will further investigate a specific group of people to learn about their history, culture, language, and their futures as a community.

Grade 5D News

Our reading strategy for this month is Inferring. With this strategy, we learned that good readers have to read between the lines within a text because the author many not say what is exactly happening in a text, so you have to use the clues from the text and what you already know to make an inference.

In Math, we studied place value up to the millions. Students can write numbers in expanded form, word form and standard form as well as rounding numbers up to the millions.

In Science, we are studying a new unit on Weather. Students studied that warmer air rises in a room, and patterns of air movement. Students created Weather Vanes and measured the wind direction on a typical breezy day in Picture Butte.

We focused on experiments that proved that air contains moisture, and that dew and other forms of precipitation comes from moisture in the air.

Reminders: Please continue to read with your child for at least 10 to 20 minutes, and practice multiplication facts each night. Easter Break starts April 19th- April 26th 2019.

The weather is turning, and things are heating up in grade six! We have a lot going on right now. For an update on what we have been doing in the classroom, please see our latest report card. Because we have so much going on in the next few months, I want to just jot down a few reminders and thoughts:

- Currently, we are working on our multiplication facts. I would like students to have their multiplication memorized up to their 12X12's. Currently, we are practicing every day in math class, but it is not enough to help them be prepared for grade 7. Please ask them what number they are on (for example, the 3 times tables). If they are doing the 3 times tables, they need to be able to do up to 3 X 12, in random order, in 30 seconds. Please practice with your child at home. This is an absolutely vital skill that they need moving forward.
- I have changed up our spelling program a little bit, and we will be doing more spelling work in class. If you would like your child to practice some of their spelling/grammar/punctuation/writing at home, please let me know. Writing is something that I would like to spend more time on in the next few months, and any help you are willing to provide at home would be much appreciated.
- Please also remember, that when your child gets to grade 7, it is expected that they are a strong reader most of the time, they are not going to be taught how to learn to read, but they will be reading to learn. This is a huge change. Please try to practice reading with your child regularly at least 15 minutes a night.
- A HUGE thank-you to Mrs. Florence Drake, who donated a ton of pop, chips, and hot dogs to our minibasketball concession. We sure appreciate you!
- Another HUGE thank-you to Mrs. Olsen, who again helped run the concession for mini-basketball. We certainly couldn't do it without her.
- Thanks also to Mrs. Gibson, who runs our hot dog days each month.
- We are doing the Growing Smiles Spring flower fundraiser again this year. Please keep an eye out for notes coming home soon.
- Just a reminder that if you are planning on coming on our Edmonton trip this year, you need a criminal record check from this school year to come along. Please contact me or the office for a letter to take to the RCMP.

Reading Topic of the Month: Sight Words

Throughout the early grades, you will frequently hear your child's teacher referring to sight words. In fact, it is likely that you have sight word flash cards or lists to refer to at home to help your child with memorizing these words.

Sight words are specific words that are selected for students to memorize, so that they can identify them and read them instantly when they see them. This skill is important for a few different reasons. The first reason is that sight words are words which appear consistently within our written language such as "the", "she", "very", etc. If a child can immediately recognize these words they have increased fluency with their reading - meaning that they can read at a quicker pace with more confidence. Furthermore, many sight words are words that do not follow "sound it out" rules, therefore, if young readers are able to memorize them, they will not become stuck when they come across these words.

Sight Word Games

There are several different ways that you can make the process of memorizing sight words engaging, active and fun. Sight word games can be played with printed or homemade sight word flash cards and provide an excellent opportunity for a family game night.

The website www.sightwords.com has a number of fantastic game descriptions and activities that can be printed out, as well. These games include: sight word "Go Fish!", sight word "Bingo", treasure hunts and much more!
