### Message from the Principal

Happy May!

I cannot believe we have only two short months until summer break – we still have so much work to do! May and June are going to be busy months with field trips, final assessments, and Provincial Achievement Tests for grade 6, also known as PATs.

If you have, or have had, a grade 6 student you probably are familiar with PATs, but even if not, it affects all our kids, K-6. There is a lot of pressure to prepare kids for PATs every year, not just in grade 6 but in all the years leading up to grade 6 (BTW, PATs will happen again when your child is in grade 9). Teachers spend quite a bit of time analyzing data around PATs in order to celebrate what we do well, and to improve.

It got me to musing, however, about the dangers of focusing too much on data – what harm can there be? Research implies that while data can help inform teachers' instruction, too much focus on data and results can be detrimental to school culture and to the students.

My two biggest concerns about focusing too much on data are:

- 1. Causing students, and let's face it parents, a lot of unneeded anxiety; and
- 2. Missing what data *can't* measure.

I can assure you we take the PAT results very seriously, but I can also assure you with great confidence, that it is balanced very solidly with DDS Staff seeing your child as the wonderful and unique person he or she is – not as a number, or a grade, or a percentage, but as a kind, unique human being.

Yes we want our kids to find success, and a part of that includes data, grades, and percentages. **HOWEVER**, the most important part to us at DDS, is developing your child, in partnership with you, to create kind, caring, resilient adults who will make a difference in the world - however that looks.

In Literacy, we are just about to complete our alphabet phonics Tongue Twisters. I have never finished the entire alphabet with a Grade 1 class before! This class is amazing! #### **Grade 2 Classroom News**

In Language Arts we will be working on a poetry unit where students will get to experiment with some different types of poems as well as figurative language, such as alliteration and similes. Along with writing poetry, we will also be reading various types of poems. To practice our reading strategies, we will continue to work in our Guided Reading

groups too.

We are continuing to work on our unit on addition and subtraction in Math. When that unit is complete we will

When that unit is complete we will start working on our 2D and 3D shapes unit, where students will learn the characteristics of shapes (triangles, squares, rectangles, circles) and objects (cubes, spheres, cones, cylinders, pyramids.)

In Science the class has enjoyed our unit on Hot and Cold temperatures and everyone did well on our unit review.

In Social Studies we have been discussing what "tourism" looks like in our 3 Canadian cities and will make brochures to celebrate the "Town of Picture Butte."

We are in the process of planning our end-of-the-year fieldtrip to the Prairie Tractor Club (May 23rd) and the Calgary Zoo (June 19<sup>th</sup>). More details will be sent out as soon as possible.




Our reading strategy for May is <u>using the context</u>. Part of reading comprehension involves **using** the other words in a sentence or passage to understand an unknown word. An author often includes hints, or **clues**, to help the reader expand vocabulary and grasp the meaning of the passage.

Poetry writing is our focus for May. Types of poems include: cinquain, limerick, haiku, acrostic, and concrete.

Reading in May involves small leveled guided reading groups. We are nearly finished our read aloud "City of Ember", an underground city that is about to run out of food and electricity. We will soon learn if a young girl and boy saves Ember.

Please practise times tables at home so learning to multiply multi-digits is much quicker.

In Science, children are learning about gears and how they work as simple machines. Students have the opportunity to make their own gear systems.

In Social Studies children will learn about the Boreal Forest region of Alberta including vegetation, animals, resources, climate, bodies of water and landforms.






#### **Grade 3 Classroom News**

We are finally enjoying some beautiful spring weather! (even though we got that little snowy surprise earlier this week!)

In Language Learning, students are just starting a unit on writing fairytale adaptations and I predict they have a lot of fun with them! We started with students taking the familiar stories of The Three Billy Goats Gruff or Little Red Riding Hood, and making some changes to the original stories. In the next bend of the unit, students will choose any fairytale that they are familiar with and will be practicing the techniques of "fracturing" the story. I can't wait to hear the ideas and witness the creativity that students will tap into during this unit!

Our current math unit is division and students need to know their quotients that correspond with the multiplication facts to 5X5. So far, students have been understanding this concept and are working hard to "switch their math brains" over to division! The next unit that we will work on is data analysis, where students will be interpreting data on graphs and making their own graphs after collecting data.

We will be wrapping up our science unit on Building Things and will end our school year with Animal Life Cycles. The next unit is Social Studies is learning about Tunisia and comparing life in Tunisia with life in Canada, much as we have with the other places we have studied in the world, since the beginning of the year.

#### **Grade 5D Classroom News**

Our shared reading novel during the month of April was, "Number the Stars" by Lois Lowry, an absolute classic and a fantastic read. A historical fiction novel, about the escape of a Jewish family from Copenhagen, Denmark, during World War II. The story focuses on tenyear-old Annemarie Johansen, who lives with her family in Copenhagen in 1943.

Our Reading Strategy for this month is Predicting. With this strategy, we learned that good readers have to think ahead while they read. Before reading, students are to read the title and illustrations and make a prediction. While they are reading, students should stop to predict what will happen next. After reading, readers could adjust and confirm their reading.


In Math, we finished our unit on decimals and fractions. We just started our new unit on Number Concepts with a review on adding and subtracting numbers up to the thousands place value. We will then add and subtract decimal numbers.

In Science, we are still studying the unit on Weather. Before the Easter Break we were lucky to have Scientists in the School come into our class and bring the weather unit to us with exciting experiments! Students will wrap up the unit in two weeks with experiments that focus on describing the Sun's energy on daily and seasonal changes, understanding that different surfaces on the face of the Earth retain and release heat at different rates, and recognize that

human actions can affect climate, and identify human actions that have been linked to the greenhouse effect.

**Reminders:** Please continue to read with your child for at least 10 to 20 minutes, and practice multiplication facts each night.

#### **Grade 5M Classroom News**

May 2019

For the month of May our focus reading comprehension strategy will be Inferring. Students will read the novel, "Underground to Canada" as a class - a historical fiction novel about the experiences of slaves in the antebellum south and their interactions with the underground railway. Students will focus on building their comprehension by filling in the gaps left by the author by seeking clues, relying on personal experience, and "reading between the lines" to draw conclusions.

In math we have begun a review of addition. Moving into May we will review subtraction before shifting our focus to adding and subtracting with decimals to the thousandths. We will continue to review place value by looking at different ways to represent a number, including expanded form, standard form, word word, and with base ten blocks or drawings. We will be creating our own imaginary restaurants with student created menus as a project to wrap-up our study of decimals. As we've begun our review I've noticed that guite a few students are struggling with their basic addition and subtraction facts. If students are quickly

and easily able to add and subtract single-digit numbers in their heads (and without their fingers), working with the more complex numbers that are required in grade five is more manageable. I will be sending home extra practice and would appreciate any extra time that could be spent practicing basic addition and subtraction facts at home.

Our Weather Watch unit in science is almost wrapped up. At the beginning of May we will complete a project about the greenhouse gas effect and how human actions can affect our climate. Our last unit of study for grade 5 science will be the Wetlands.

In social we've looked closer at Confederation including the main players, who was included in the early stages and more importantly who was left out of the process and decision making. Students have also learned about the importance of the railway to Canada's history and we will move into a study of the Famous Five shortly. field trip

LA - In reading, we are currently working on the reading strategy of inferring, where students try to fill in the holes or gaps that good authors leave. We are reading an excellent book called "Iqbal." In writing, we continued to hone our short story writing skills in preparation for the Provincial Achievement Test in a couple weeks.



Math - we are currently working on understanding fractions, decimals, and percentages. Knowing their times tables is such a key skill - so please keep practicing and working on them!

Social - We are just wrapping up our unit on Local Government, and will start soon on Provincial Government.

Science - We are finishing up our unit on Air and Aerodynamics, and will start Flight within a week or two.

#### Reading Strategy - Chunking or "Chunky Monkey"

A significant part of learning to read is memorizing a number of different patterns that are found consistently within words. As growing readers learn more and more of these patterns, it becomes easier for them to identify them within new and/or challenging words. Therefore, chunking is an excellent strategy for helping students to decode words. This strategy can be used in a few different ways.

- 1. Identifying individual sounds (about = /a/+/b/+/ou/+/t/)
- 2. Identifying smaller words within larger words (skate = /sk/ + /ate/)

The next time you are reading with your child and they are working on decoding a word, instead of saying "sound it out", try using "chunky monkey" to have a conversation about which sounds and patterns they know and work together to blend those sounds to form the word.
