
- Ask your child how she feels about school.

#### Grade 1 News

October has flown by in Grade 1! My Grade 1 students have been working so hard on learning to read, it is really incredible! We are learning how to "chunk" words up to find the smaller words that we already know. We also have learned about the "Sneaky E", and the "Screaming EEs". During October, we have learned about the letters "d, e and f" and all the sounds



that each letter can make in words. We have also learned about the vowels 'a' and 'i' and how they both have short and long sounds. Our word families have been "-ad", "-ing" and "-it". In Writing, the students are learning how to add a little more detail to their sentences. In Math, the students are improving daily on their 'Quick Counts' and have learned about different characteristics of various shapes in the unit of Shape and Space. We have completed our unit in Social Studies on 'Mapping Our World' and are moving into My Community. In Science, we are nearing the end of our unit on Colour, but are still intermittently working on our "Changing Seasons" unit, as we are moving into Winter.

Our Harvest Gala was a huge success and we would like to thank ALL of the many volunteers who spent a lot of time and efforts to ensure its success. As well, a huge THANK YOU goes out to all of our Grade 1 families that donated something to our "Night at the Movies" basket that was very well received! Our basket sold for well over \$100!

The students had a fantastic Halloween celebration at school, and loved spreading a little kindness and Halloween cheer in our community!

#### Grade 2 News



In Language Arts we will continue working on the reading strategy of self-monitoring, which means asking ourselves questions while we read to make sure we understand the text. Students are learning how to pick "good fit" books, to fit their purpose, interests and comprehension levels. We have also started our Guided Reading which gives us opportunities to work in small groups to practice specific skills in reading as well as writing. Students have been doing personal writing, sharing their stories both orally and in print. We are looking forward to publishing our favorite story in the next weeks, which will allow us to work on some revising and editing skills as well. Students have

been including a problem in their stories and seem to really enjoy putting their ideas into print! I look forward to reading all of the grade 2 creations throughout this year.

In math our patterns unit is wrapping up as students are demonstrating their knowledge of the outcomes that we have covered so far. Our next unit will be place value and numbers to 50. We are also working on problem solving using our reading skills to read questions, identify what the question is asking us to find, re-reading the question to identify information we need and then solving the problem. We will continue to practice these steps throughout each of the upcoming units as well.

#### **Grade 3 News**



We have had a great start to the year and I am really enjoying getting to know the grade 3s!

In language arts we have been implementing guided reading groups and working on developing our "reading strategies toolbox." Each week we will be practicing a variety of word solving strategies that students can use when reading independently.

In writing we have been working through the writing process, to improve on our stories and elaborate with details. I am extremely proud of the hard work that students have put into their personal narratives! Currently, we are sharing our writing in class so we can celebrate everyone's growth!

In math we finished our patterns unit and have started the place value unit, where students learn writing and reading numbers to 1000, comparing numbers, ordering them and estimating.

The students are still enjoying our rocks and minerals unit in science. We will wrap up the unit this month by learning about types of erosion and we will begin our unit on hearing and sound.

In Social Studies, we are learning about Peru and how it is the same or different from our life in Canada. Students made passports to "travel" to the new country and we are enjoying learning about a different culture.

#### **Grade 5D News**

Our reading strategy for this month was Synthesizing. With this strategy, we learned the difference between the main events and details within a text. Students also learned how to arrange the main events in a sequential order.

In Math, we finished our Measurement, Area and Perimeter Unit. Students understand how to measure using units such as cm, mm, and m, and how to convert each unit of measurement. For example, there are 10 mm in 1 cm etc. We also focused on how to find the perimeter and area of a given shape.

In Science, we wrapped up our Electricity and Magnetism Unit. Students had a blast exploring various circuits such as open, closed, series and parallel. They also tested materials that would make good conductors, insulators and resistors. We also discussed electromagnets and the significance of the efficiency label found on electrical appliances.



Reminders: There is no school for students on November 12<sup>th</sup> and the 13<sup>th</sup> due to Teacher Professional Development. Please continue to read with your child for at least 10 to 20 minutes, and practice multiplication facts nightly.

#### **Grade 4 News**

Looking ahead, parent-teacher interviews will be held on November 15. A time slot will be scheduled on that day. If this time does not work for you, please let us know and we will be more than happy to change it for a more convenient time.



#### Literacy:

Grade fours are currently listening to a read-aloud called <u>Ugly</u>, a memoir by Robert Hoge. This is a true story about Robert who was born with a tennis-ball sized tumor in the middle of his face and short twisted legs. It is a story about belonging in a world where beauty is who you are, not what you look like.

Children are reading in literacy groups at their own instructional levels. We are writing personal narratives about children's own experiences. This includes a beginning, middle, end and adding descriptive details, characters and a setting.

#### **Numeracy:**

Children are learning to add and subtract numbers up to the 1000s place value. This skill goes much quicker if children know their addition and subtraction facts to 20 fluently (accurate and fast!). PLEASE practise this at home. Thank you!

#### Social:

We are currently studying the Foothills region of Alberta. This includes geography such as landforms, climate, vegetation, animals, bodies of water and natural resources.

#### Thank you's:

Thank you parents for practising times table facts, and addition facts.


Thank you parents for practising spelling words and ensuring your children read a book of their choosing for 15 minutes a day.

#### **Grade 5M News**



The year continues to run smoothly and I am excited to see the growth our class is already making towards being more responsible and respectful learners. In language arts we have just wrapped up our first major unit in writing - realistic fiction. Students spent a lot of time learning about the importance of revision and editing to the writing process and worked collaboratively with partners to make their stories the best they could be. Once students were convinced they had completed their best work I spent some time working with each writer to set some goals to help keep moving forward. In our reading we have completed our selfmonitoring unit by working in our levelled guided reading groups.

In math students have moved on to our study of Measurement with a focus so far on how to measure length using millimeters and centimeters, estimating lengths and choosing the best unit of measurement for a variety of objects, calculating the perimeter and area of various rectangles, and finally examining the relationship between perimeter and area of rectangles. To finish up the unit the class will learn about finding the volume of rectangular prisms and estimating capacity in mL and L. Throughout the Measurement unit students have also been exposed to word problems dealing with the big concepts of the unit.

In science the class has finished our first unit, Electricity and Magnetism, and wrote their first major unit exam. We worked on several review activities in class, including a study guide that students were to bring home for extra practice. Most of the class really set themselves up for success by studying on their own time as well as in class and should be proud of how they did. If your child is not satisfied with their grade on the test they have been given a chance to do an extra credit assignment to help improve their overall mark. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions about this.

In social so far we have learned about our first physical region of Canada and some of the important groups of people in the region in the past and now. As we move through the different regions of Canada we will examine several common themes such as the factors that affect quality of life, the climate, the physical features, and natural resources. We will also learn about some of the First Nations groups in the area, both historically and in present day.

#### Important Notes:

- As we amp up our math study it is really helpful for students to know their math facts fluently
- Try asking your child addition, subtraction, multiplication and division questions over dinner and watch their strategies for answering
- Can they answer automatically?
- Do they use their fingers?
- Do they skip count?

#### Grade 6 News

I can't believe that we have actually had a real fall this year! The warm(ish) weather has been pretty exciting.

Here is what we have been up to in our subject areas:

LA - in reading, we have been working on the skill of analyzing. This skill involves being able to prove what you think you know by backing up your opinions with facts. In writing, we are finishing up our personal narratives on powerful life stories. In the next week or two, we will start learning how to write essays.

Math - in math, we just finished perimeter, area, and volume. We are now working on drawing, measuring, and classifying angles. One thing I have noticed is that many of us struggle with our basic math facts - please keep an eye out for a homework package to practice math facts.

Science - We are busy learning how to solve crimes. So far, we have looked at how to analyze footprints, fingerprints, and different types of ink.



Social - Students have been busy exploring the different social roles of people in Ancient Athens. Many of them have been turning their information into podcasts. If you want, get your child to log into Google Classroom to show you their podcast!

As mentioned earlier, this is a skill that is lacking in quite a few of us - please keep an eye out for the homework package that is going to be sent home.
