Literacy News

Reading Strategy of the Month: Flip the Sound

One of the most challenging aspects of reading and writing is the number of tricky patterns and letters that create different sounds. All vowels and some consonants have more than one sound, which can make certain words challenging for beginning readers and writers.

When you are reading with your child, if they use a sound that matches the letter, but it is incorrect for the word, encourage them to try “flipping the sound”. This way, your child is using their knowledge of letter sounds to work through the challenging word as independently as possible.

Reading/Writing Trick: “Magic e”

“Magic e” is a word pattern which “flips” a vowel sound. If “C” represents a consonant, and “V” represents a vowel, the word pattern is as follows: CVCe . When this word pattern occurs, the vowel before the letter e *make its long sound or “says its name”*. *This pattern may be referred to in a number of ways at school including: Magic e, Pinchy e, Sneaky e, Super e, etc. Therefore, it is important to ask your child what they call this word pattern in their classroom, so you can use matching language at home.*

Example “Magic e” Words: make, these, kite, hope, cute



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
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Grade 2 News

Where has the time gone? It is already March! The Grade 2's have been continuing to work hard on improving their reading and writing during February. We have added new stories in each child's personal reader and all of the students have increased their reading level by at least 2 levels or more. In March we will be focusing on the reading strategy of sequencing, through our individual reading as well as in our guided reading groups.



In our writing we are concentrating on creating original stories that have interesting beginning, which draw our readers in, developing setting by using our senses and introducing our main character by slipping in a few of his/her physical characteristics as well as personality traits. Students have also worked on editing stories they have written previously and we have even made a few classroom books for all to enjoy.

In Math we are wrapping up our unit on addition and subtraction (numbers to 50) and will be increasing our math skills by now including numbers from 0 to 100. We have also been working on calendar skills daily, such as ordinals, odd / even numbers and skip counting by 2's, 5's and 10's. At home you can continue to help your child with all of these skills by playing card games, snakes and ladders and dominoes.



In Social we have wrapped up our section on natural resources and jobs that can be found in our three Canadian cities: Iqaluit, Meteghan and Saskatoon.

In Science we are just starting our unit on temperature. You could help your child with this unit by discussing the temperature in Celsius on a daily basis, how to dress appropriately for the weather and if possible allow your child to try and read a thermometer you may have outside.

I also attended some fabulous sessions during Teacher's Convention and have already started to share these activities with the students.

Finally, I look forward to seeing all of you for our Student-Led Conference in March.

Grade 3 News

March... in like a lion? Hopefully we start to get some spring weather soon! I'm ready to say good-bye to the snow.

In Language Arts, we are continuing working with our guided reading groups to practice reading skills. I'm really seeing students using some different strategies to have more success with their individual reading. Students are also trying some different genres of books and it's awesome to see them branching out! Students are currently working on paragraph writing, using a topic sentence and including 3 to 4 sentences. They are writing pieces about a variety of subjects they are interested in.

In math we are working on multiplication. I have been very impressed with how enthusiastic students are about practicing their multiplication tables. In the grade 3 curriculum, students need to memorize the facts to 5 X 5, so please practice these with your children. Every student makes flashcards when they are done the work for each number, so feel free to practice with these or check out some websites that allow for more practice as well! The more practice they get, the easier the facts will be for students to recall. I will also give students extra practice pages to bring home, if they want. The order that we are learning the multiplication tables is 0, 1, 2, 5, 4 and 3. For students who master these facts, there will be opportunities for them to learn some of the facts beyond that. Thank you so much for your help in this area. It is so important for students to memorize these facts to ensure future success in math.

We are finishing up our science unit on Hearing and Sound so our next units will be Building and Testing. Students will first learn about various building materials and what makes a structure stronger, and then they will be able to construct a structure to test their knowledge!

On Thursday, March 21, the grade 3 class will be going on a field trip to the Galt Museum in the morning, to take part in their Building Bridges program. Then in the afternoon, we will be attending the Gems and Minerals show. A permission form will be sent home with all of the details in the first week of March.

Congratulations to Ryder F., Jonah and Emerald for getting 100%, five times in a row on their spelling tests. They have "bumped up" to more challenging groups. You have all been working very hard on your spelling, and it definitely shows. Be proud!

Thank you to all families who sent treats for the Valentine's Day party. We really enjoyed all of the yummy goodies!

Grade 4 News

Our reading focus for March continues to be inferencing (reaching conclusions based on the information in a text and your own experiences).

Our shared reading is a novel called "Skinny Bones" by Barbara Park. This story is narrated by the main character, Alex Frankovitch, an unpopular and awkward 10 year-old boy. During this shared reading, we will address all of the key reading strategies including how to:

- Predict: Use evidence and prior knowledge to help you think about what will happen in a text.
- Infer: Use evidence and prior knowledge to help find out important details that the author doesn't specifically tell you.
- Visualize: Use the words and details in the text to make pictures in your head.
- Question: Ask questions while reading to help monitor your understanding.
- Connect: Make connections between what you read, your own experiences, other books, and the world.
- Evaluate: Use your own opinions to talk about a text
- Summarize: Brainstorm and write about the most important details about a text.
- Determine Importance: Come up with what is the most important things about a text.
- Synthesize: Organize, recall, and recreate information, and fit it in with what you already know.



In writing, students are learning to compose informational paragraphs. This involves educating readers about various topics. Children choose a topic, brainstorm ideas, organize their ideas, compose a rough draft and write a final copy. These paragraphs are organized into an introduction, middle and conclusion.

Children are beginning to make progress on their times tables! Keep practicing so we can hit our multiplication unit head on in April! In March, we will cover rounding of whole numbers and decimals, how to calculate the area of regular and irregular 2-D shapes, an understanding of congruency, and an understanding of line symmetry.

Our Science focus for March is on Light & Shadows. Students will be learning about sources of light, materials that light can pass through, and about what happens when a material blocks or changes the path of light. By observing shadows students will discover that light and shadows follow a predictable path. We will be experimenting with mirrors, prisms and a variety of other materials that can affect the path by reflecting light and by splitting light into colours.

Archery is on March 8, 15, and 29 from 9-10 am at the Picture Butte Archery Range. Parents are welcome to join us and help out.

I look forward to seeing parents and children during Student Lead Conferencing on March 13, 2019.


Grade 5D News

Our reading strategy for this month was Making Connections. With this strategy, we learned that good readers make personal connections to the text by using the three main ideas, text-to-text, text-to-self, and text-to-world. Students used prompts to make connections such as, I think..., this reminds me of..., this makes me think about.., and I remember.

To honour Black History Month we are currently reading the historical fiction book "Underground to Canada," by Barbara Smucker. The dramatic story takes place in the Southern United States, the protagonist is a young girl, Julilly, and her flight from slavery.

In Math, we recently finished our expressions and equations unit, students had to identify and solve unknown variables. We are now currently studying word problems using the following operations, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and division.

In Science, we have finished our Classroom Chemistry Unit. Students conducted experiments by mixing materials together to see what happens: which material will dissolve, which material reacts and which material remains unaffected. Students tested that a solid can dissolve and be recovered for example, a crystal can be recovered when the liquid evaporates. Students also discovered when mixing two materials together, they can create a chemical reaction such as carbon dioxide gas and explain how this gas is different from air.



Reminders: Please continue to read with your child for at least 10 to 20 minutes, and practice multiplication facts nightly. There is no school on March 11, and March 19.



Grade 5M News

Well March has sure come quickly! We had an awesome day at the ski hill and have to say a HUGE thank you to our parent volunteers: Mr. Marti, Mrs. and Mr. McLeod, Mrs. Hanna, Mr. Quinn, Ms. Kawauchi, Ms. Neels, and Mr. Spanke. Also a huge shout out to Mr. Van Dyk for all his hard work organizing, Ms. Dennahower for joining us on the slopes, and Ms. Rogerson and Mike for helping keep everyone safe for the day.

For the month of March our focus reading comprehension strategy will be Making Connections. Students will be finishing up our read aloud Number the Stars before moving in to some small guided reading groups. Our writing unit, Literary Essays, will focus on examining short fictional stories to grow our own ideas and dig deep in the text for evidence.



In math we are moving forward and are getting into the "meat" of the math curriculum - number sense. We will be starting off with estimation, rounding, reading and writing numerals to a million, reading and writing number words and place value to a million. We will also continue to practice our mental addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. When practicing these facts at home with your child please watch for:

- can your child readily answer a fact question within 3-5 seconds?
- do they know the fact families? (the numbers that belong together like 9, 3, and 27)
- are they still using their fingers to skip count?



In science we are just finishing our Classroom Chemistry unit and will be starting to examine the weather soon. Fingers crossed that the snow melts and we can get outside for some experiments! In social we will be heading into our last region - the Arctic.
