

Nurture with Nature

Reconnecting kids with nature has been shown to help children focus in school, boost a positive attitude and increase physical activity. Children are certainly losing touch with outdoors – a Canadian study shows that the number of kids who play outside at school decreases from 87% to 17% between grades 3 and 11. Seventy percent of youth spend an hour or less outdoors daily.

The effects of exposing and connecting children to nature are widespread and valuable. School grounds made greener by planting trees, building ponds and fostering gardens increases physical activity in elementary school children. Even having green space nearby has been shown to temper stressful life events in younger kids.

How you can help:

Start slow and make it a family goal to have at least 15 minutes of 'green time' a day, even if that just



means a walk together outside. Role modeling is essential to fostering a child's positive connection to nature.

Advocate for more time outside for your children at school, be it through extra gym classes outside or making outdoor learning a part of the other class lessons. Don't let the cold or snow stop you in Alberta! Many communities have free access to a variety of outdoor activities – Just make sure to bundle up!

Nurturing your child with nature is an easy way to improve their entire well-being.

Grade 1 News

Well...that was an amazing start to the year! I have the most wonderful group of littles that I could have ever hoped for. They have humour, personality and kindness built into them and make it so much fun to come to school each and every day.

In Literacy, we are reviewing our letters and sounds. We are also learning strategies for decoding words. We are learning about several English language rules, and then learning that as soon as we learn a rule, we will find many, many words that will break that rule. The English language is a difficult language to learn and reading is no exception. So, that being said, it is important to understand that learning to read can be a slow process, and we need to be patient, diligent, and consistent. I thank all of you that are ensuring that your child is doing their reading each and every day possible. This year, your child will read the SAME book each night for an entire week, to ensure that some accuracy and fluency is being gained. Our writing in Grade 1 is an even slower process. We are focusing on our printing, copying words and sentences, and understanding what good sentences are and what they are made up of.

In Numeracy, we are looking at a new number each day, and how we can represent that number. We are also learning about Patterns. The students are learning how to name patterns (AB, ABC, ABB, AAB, etc.) and are doing an incredible job. We will be starting to look at pattern cores, and how to continue patterns.

In Science, we are learning about the Seasons and Weather, and in Social Studies, we are learning some basic mapping skills and about where we are in the world.

I would like to thank all of the parents for helping make their child's Grade 1 experience a great one. We had an amazing Terry Fox Run, and the Grade 1s would like to thank the Home and School Council for affording us the wonderful opportunity to have the Bouncy Obstacle Course as well as KONA Ice! We are truly spoiled, but in a very great way! As well, a very special thank you to Miss Wiebe, our assistant in our classroom. She keeps us all on track! Here is to an even better October!

Welcome back to all of the returning Grade 2 students. During September we have been busy establishing classroom routines and expectations and all of the children are doing a

fantastic job remembering them. We also have two new students joining our class this year. They are Jamie Salberg and Hyrum Bowden. If you see these students in the hall or on the playground please say hi and continue to make them feel welcome at DDS.

In Language Arts we have been working on reading comprehension, making words activities, and printing. We will continue to write our spelling words in our agenda and I really appreciate if everyone can continue practicing them at home. It really does help! Each day we complete the following activities: read to self, read to partners and listen to taped books. We have also been completing writing assignments that involve getting to know each of the grade 2 students better. In Math, we have been working on patterns and skip counting by 2's, 5's and 10's. We have also started completing a daily math minute drill that tests each student's ability to add digits quickly and accurately in a specific amount of time.

We will soon be finishing up our unit in Science on magnets and the students really have enjoyed the "hands on" activities. We have also begun our "Recipe of the Week" activity and have made toast, orange Julius, nachos and grilled cheese sandwiches. Yum!! Finally, in Social Studies we will begin learning unique and interesting things about the following three Canadian cities: Iqaluit, Saskatoon and Meteghan.

Thank you to all the parents who have been signing their child's agenda and checking the front pocket for important information. It is greatly appreciated. Anyone who has not signed up for the "remind" app on your phone, please do so asap. A special thank you for packing healthy snacks and lunches. Grade 3 News

We have 20 students in grade 3 this year and I am looking forward to a lot of learning and fun with this group!



In Language Arts we are setting a goal of making this our best reading year yet! We are learning about how to choose books that are just right for us, adding strategies to our reader's toolboxes, and exploring a variety of books in our classroom library. Throughout the year we will be working in some guided reading groups, to focus on building reading strategies and practicing them with support. Students will also have daily reading time where they can choose books that they are interested in and continue practicing those strategies!

We are starting our writing this year with personal narratives. Students are writing daily and I have been so impressed with how much more they are writing, even after only a month! I love how they are sharing stories that are important to them and also how they are genuinely trying different writing techniques that we are noticing in mentor texts. The grade 3 students are excited to share their writing and show how much they are growing as writers!

In math during the first month of school we did some review of addition strategies. The unit we are currently on is patterns and in grade 3 students learn about increasing and decreasing patterns: how to make, compare and extend them.

Our current science unit is Rocks and Minerals so students are finding many interesting rocks that we are sharing. We were so lucky to have Scientist Jane, from Scientists in Schools, come to our classroom on September 24, for a workshop where we learned a lot! Thank you to the DDS Home and School, who paid for this wonderful experience in our classroom!

We are starting social studies with a unit on our community, our province and our country, so we can compare and contrast our experiences with those in the other communities we study throughout the year.

-Just a reminder that our library class is every THURSDAY so please remind your child to bring back his / her library books for that day.

-We will be celebrating Halloween on Thursday, October 31. If you would like to send a treat / snack for our party, please send me a message on Remind or jot a note for me in the agenda. Thank you!

Grade 4 News

Grade 4 is off to a grand start this year!

Our read-aloud novel is “Tales of a Fourth Grade Nothing” by Judy Blume. This is the story of 9 year-old, Peter, who lives in an apartment in the middle of New York City with his parents and 4 year-old-brother. Needless to say, “Fudge” gets into mischief and, more often than not, Peter is left to deal with these hilarious situations.



We finished a shared chapter book by David Adler called “Cam Jensen and the Barking Treasure Mystery”. Children explored parts of a story based on the main characters, setting, problem and solution.

Our focus for reading is self-monitoring. In a nutshell, this is readers asking themselves if they comprehend what they are reading. If not, then students can activate problem-solving strategies and use them from the Fix-up Anchor Chart:

- o Slow down
- o Reread and/or read on
- o Summarize (retell)
- o Visualize (picture in your head)
- o Look at pictures, charts, etc.
- o Check tricky words
- o Read a part aloud
- o Flags difficult spots with sticky notes
- o Talk to a friend
- o Ask for Help.

Students are working on basic sentence writing focussing on conventions (capitals, periods, question marks, exclamation marks), and spelling. We are also learning how to expand on our ideas and thoughts by adding either the word “because” or “so”. Look at this example: “It is a rainy day.” We can add ‘so’ to make this a much more interesting sentence: “It is a rainy day **so** I should take my umbrella and raincoat with me when I walk to school.” Here is another example: “The window is cracked.” We can add ‘because’ to make it more interesting: “The window is cracked **because** the temperature went down to minus 38 degrees Celsius.”


Students will write personal narratives in October and November.

We recently finished a Pattern Unit in Math. This included shape patterns up to three attributes (characteristics), increasing and decreasing number patterns and the use of T-charts to solve problems. In October and November students will learn place value in detail up to the 10,000s position including numerals (1 256), expanded notation (1 000 + 200 + 50 + 6), number words (one thousand, two hundred fifty-six), place value charting (1 thousand, 2 hundreds, 5 tens and 6 ones) and representing numbers using pictures:

We are also working on multiplication and division facts. In September, we practiced the 2 times tables. Your child should know these facts fluently (quickly and accurately). Children should also be able to count forwards and backwards by 2s to 50 super fast! We move onto the 3 times tables in October. By the end of October, children should be able to count by 3s to 48 super fast and know their 3 times to 12 fluently. **Please practice these facts at home.**



We completed a science unit called Waste and Our World. Every Wednesday throughout the year, Grade 4 students collect paper and cardboard for the entire school and place it into an outside recycling bins for pickup. We change gears in October and move from science to Social Studies and learn about the geographic areas of Alberta beginning with the prairies, foothills and Rocky Mountains. Grade 5 News.....

Welcome back to DDS! I'm having such a great time getting to know this new batch of kids and I feel as though our classroom is really feeling like a team. In language arts our focus has been on self-monitoring and understanding theme and plot in our reading to ensure we can become the best readers we can be. Students have had the chance to listen and read along to "Hatchet" as a modelled text and will participate in shared reading of a biography about a Canadian war hero as soon as we've finished up our novel read aloud. Students also take part in our independent reading time as much as possible. To demonstrate their comprehension we have been writing in our Reading Response Journals. **Thank you to all those who are helping by encouraging at least 20 minutes of reading at home every night!**



In writing we are undertaking a "writing bootcamp" to launch the year. We are slowly moving through some of the basics for writing high quality sentences and have spent some time analyzing errors (such as fragments and run-on sentences) as well as learning how to fix those mistakes in our own writing. Students have also been learning about parts of speech to help their writing. Lastly this month we have focused on writing strong paragraphs that include a topic sentence, an attention grabber, relevant details, transition words, and strong closing sentences.

In math, the class has kicked off the year studying Measurement. We have learned about accurately measuring length using rulers and meter sticks, using referents to estimate lengths, and finally how to find area and perimeter of various shapes. Our first science unit, Classroom Chemistry, is about half-way through and has allowed for some experimentation. In social we have been focusing on our mapping skills as an introduction to our Physical Regions of Canada unit. Having a basic understanding of maps and geography will be a huge help as we enter this content heavy unit.

Welcome to another year at Dorothy Dalglish! I am so excited to be back teaching grade six, and I am loving this new group of grade 6's! Here are a few notes about what we have been doing:



Math - We started our unit on Statistics and Probability. Students looked at chance and how to calculate the probability of a certain event happening. They also explored how to collect and display data (it's actually more exciting than it sounds!)

Science - Our first unit is on Trees and Forests. We have been cruising around the neighborhood, checking out different trees and doing experiments.



This year, we have also started options classes. Mrs. Fraser has been teaching Drama to the students, and I have been teaching computer programming. It's been a lot of fun, and I think the students are really enjoying themselves. Please ask them about it!

Just a few other notes to be aware of:

- Please have your child read at least 20 minutes a night. In order to become better readers, they must be practicing regularly. It doesn't really matter what they read, as long as it is appropriate for their ability.
- Also, we are really working on our multiplication this year. Please practice multiplication for at least 5 minutes a night with your child (you can use flash cards, an app, or ask your child to show you what we have been doing in class).
- A huge thank-you to everyone who participated in our leadership day in August - and a big thank-you to Ms. Rogerson, who planned the whole thing. Our leadership program has never been better!
- Thanks to Mrs. Stauth and Mrs. Hillyer, who faithfully keep our school running and looking amazing!
- A big thank-you to Mrs. Gibson, who has been doing the hot dog days for the last few years. We really appreciate her volunteerism, as well as how she includes the grade sixes!
