Kindergarten

What an exciting and busy month it has been in Kindergarten! March has brought so many wonderful moments, and it's been incredible to see the growth of each of our young learners. From celebrating St. Patrick's Day to welcoming the first day of spring, and even hosting our student-led conferences, there has been so much to celebrate and reflect on.

Language Arts: In our phonics lessons this month, we covered the letters X, W, Y, and Z, which helped expand our letter knowledge. We've also been working on spelling some of our high-frequency words like "at," "bed," "the," "stop," and "love," among others. It has been exciting to watch the students gain confidence in their reading and writing abilities. In writing, we've continued to practice using our writing journals. The children have been focusing on writing small, within the lines, and remembering to leave spaces between words using their fingers. This is a skill that's coming along beautifully, and we're so proud of the progress everyone has made!

In **Physical Education**, we've been working hard on building resilience, particularly with tag games. The children are becoming more confident in their movement skills and perseverance. We've also started practicing soccer skills, like kicking toward a target, which has been a lot of fun! For **Wellness**, our focused feeling this month was insecurity. We discussed why we feel this and how we can see that we are all different, but that is what makes each of us beautiful!

In **Social Studies**, we've begun learning about **traditions** and how they differ around the world. It's been a fascinating exploration of how people celebrate different customs, and the students are becoming more aware of the diversity in the world around them.

In **Science**, as spring approaches, we've started discussing the **life cycle of plants** and how they grow. We've also been learning about seasonal changes and what that means for both nature and our day-to-day lives. It's been a great way to tie in the changes we see outside with our learning in the classroom.

March also saw a big focus on **Numeracy** skills. The students had the opportunity to showcase their addition skills during our student-led conferences, and they've continued to build on these skills with the help of our Grade 6 buddies. We've also been using manipulatives to solve addition problems and will soon begin practicing subtraction. Additionally, our understanding of **patterns** has grown, and the children are recognizing patterns not only in shapes and colors but also in our daily routines at school.

It's truly amazing to see how much the students have grown this month. Their hard work and dedication to learning continue to impress all of us, and we can't wait to see what April brings! Thank you for your continued support. We are so proud of all the hard work and effort that the Kindergarten class has shown.



Grade 2/3

April is finally here! What an exciting month ahead with Spring Break just around the corner!

In Reading we recently finished The BFG by Roald Dahl. The students thoroughly enjoyed the plot and consistently demonstrated excellent comprehension skills! They also enjoyed learning a plethora of rich, new vocabulary words from each chapter!

In Writing the children have begun a Fictional Narrative Unit, whereby they will be using the five story elements to craft a narrative of their choice. Students will analyze a variety of Mentor Texts for inspiration. We are very excited for the creativity and craftsmanship that comes with this unit!



In Math we finished the algebra and pre-algebra units, whereby students worked at balancing equations and determining unknown variables. We have started learning about measuring time. Grade 2s have been learning about measuring with non-standard units and using months, days, and years to represent the passage of time. The Grade 3s are currently working at interpreting time accurately using analog clocks. In addition, the Grade 3s continue to work hard at their multiplication facts. Please continue to review fact flashcards at home!

Congratulations to Jesus, Octavia and Maverick for mastering their 2 and 10 facts, to Sam for mastering his 2, 10, 5 and 1 facts in 2/3B and to Max and Alex for mastering 0-2 facts in 2/3A!

In Science, students continue to investigate movement and energy sources. They have enjoyed learning about the six simple machines and how these make work easier! Students have engaged in a variety of experiments where they have seen these simple machines in action!

We are wrapping up our Ukraine Unit in Social Studies. Students have made a lot of meaningful connections to the subject matter in this unit!







Grades 4, 5, and 6 recently wrapped up our mini basketball program with a tournament that showcased the skills they developed during intramurals.

The Grade 4 class would like to extend a huge thank you to Mrs. Vandenberg for her support, as well as Mrs. Van Zeggelaar and Miss Wiebe for volunteering to run Flip's Food Cart during the tournament. We also appreciate the incredible staff at DDS who made this event possible!

In **Literacy**, we recently completed our Informational Writing unit and had the opportunity to showcase our books at the Student-Led Conferences. The students put in a tremendous amount of effort, and they should be proud of their final products! This past week, we kicked off our Poetry unit, which has been off to a fantastic start.

In **Numeracy**, we wrapped up our unit on fractions and have now moved on to Patterns. Next week, students will begin exploring algebraic expressions and problem-solving strategies.

In **Science**, students have been investigating the four Earth system spheres and the various relationships that shape our planet.

In **Social Studies**, we've been delving into Alberta's history, learning about Indigenous peoples and the arrival of European settlers.

Looking ahead, our next **Intramural** activity will be **belly baseball**, which will take place on Mondays from 12:00-12:20!

March has been a busy and exciting month in our classroom! It was wonderful to see students proudly showcase their hard work during student-led conferences. Their growth and dedication over the past couple of months were evident, and I truly enjoyed celebrating their accomplishments with families.

In Language Arts, we continue our word study and writing descriptive paragraphs. Students worked diligently to structure their paragraphs with a clear topic sentence, three supporting details, and a strong closing sentence. They also practiced incorporating similes, metaphors, and sensory language. Next, we'll concentrate on writing engaging topic sentences that hook readers and using transitions to create smooth, logical flow in their writing. I'm excited to see their progress as we prepare to write an expert essay after the April break.

In Math, we completed our units on ratios, fractions, decimals, and percents. Students are now exploring different methods for multiplying 3-digit by 2-digit numbers, including the standard algorithm and the boxed method. Our daily number talks have been a great opportunity for students to strengthen their mental math skills and confidently share their strategies. We also celebrated Pi Day with a hands-on activity where students discovered the value of pi for themselves by measuring the circumference and diameter of various circles around the school, finding the ratio between them.


In Science, students investigated the forces of flight by designing and testing various paper airplanes. Through careful adjustments, they experimented with how forces like lift, thrust, and drag affected their planes' performance. Next, we will explore buoyancy as students compare how forces act on objects in water versus air.

In Social Studies, students independently completed a current events assignment, selecting an article from CBC Kids News that interested them. They thoughtfully reflected on how these stories connect to their lives or impact the world around them. We also explored primary and secondary sources and how they help us learn about the past. Up next, we will dive into learning about select ancient civilizations!

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
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
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A big thank you goes out to all the parents, students and staff who baked cakes, cookies and cupcakes for our Cake Auction!! We raised over \$1000!! Preparations are in place for our Royal Tyrrell Museum field trip next month. We are also very excited to experience the Westwind Thunder, a group of Indigenous dancers from Cardston Elementary who will be performing at DDS this week, along with Indigenous beading and learning activities.



In <u>Language Arts</u>, students are learning about media which encompasses a study of website and news validity, advertising and digital citizenship. Students are currently analyzing advertising. Next, students will develop a product and advertising campaign to present to the class.

In <u>Mathematics</u>, students are able to solve one-step algebraic operations. We are 'thin-slicing' these concepts into small, manageable steps, and emphasizing the importance of 'showing your work.' Next week, we will begin two-step equations which are essentially the same concept, only a little more challenging:)

In <u>Science</u>, we are finishing our Temperature and Particles Theory unit. Students have built homemade thermoscopes to observe the effect of thermal expansion and are able to speak to the concept. We'll be studying Energy & Climate next.



We continue to study Democracy in <u>Social Studies</u>. and we are currently looking at the consensus-based democracy within the Haudenosaunee culture. Students have created storyboards detailing 'The Great Law of Peace,' how Hiawatha spread the word of nonviolence and used the wampum belt as a treaty amongst the five Iroquois nations Students will be studying the roles of Clan Mothers, Chiefs and the Grand Council in the next week.

A few Reminders...

- Now that spring is here, the classroom feels a lot warmer, so students are asked to not wear toques in the classroom.
- Multiplication fluency facts are so important to the math units we are studying. Quizzing your kiddo at home on multiplication facts would be a great benefit!
- If you have not yet returned your permission form for the Royal Tyrrell Museum field trip, the time is now!

Music Class "Notes"

March is one of my most favorite times in the music room because we get to learn about the music of Ireland and why many people celebrate St. Patrick's Day.

In Kindergarten, we enthusiastically enjoyed listening to and playing along with a Celtic piece of music. We also had fun moving in different ways to the song March Along Like Leprechaun. We have been exploring the unpitched percussion instrument families and also singing about bees and flowers for Spring.

The Grade 1 class took advantage of the last few weeks of winter to explore unpitched percussion instrument families and learn a song entitled "Snow Snow" to use with the book Froggy Gets Dressed by Jonathan London. We also enjoyed learning a stepping pattern to the song Lucky Little Leprechaun. We are taking turns being "action leaders" at the beginning of music class and have also begun learning about the difference between beat and rhythm.

Grade 2/3 had a lot of fun learning the song "If You Catch a Leprechaun" and then singing their wish. We then discussed the number of sounds we needed to transfer that wish to its musical notation and practiced writing out our wishes. In the latter part of the month, we shifted our focus to rain for our "Spring" theme as we started reading and singing "It's Raining, It's Pouring" where we will add 3 different instrument parts to accompany our singing. A highlight of the month was learning the song Caimarusa as a movement warm-up.

The Grade 4 class began learning the ukulele and have been mainly playing along with songs using the first chord position we learned, C chord. We recently added the F chord to our repertoire and have begun practicing switching between the two chord positions. As we get used to moving between different chord positions, we will add new songs to our repertoire.

The Grade 5 class has been extending their ukulele skills from last year with the review of C, F, Am and G7 chords. We have been playing along with the song Kookaburra in order to practice reading chord progressions along with lyrics of a song and listening for the changes without having an external accompaniment or video.

The Grade 6 class has also been extending their ukulele learning with a focus on trying out different strumming patterns using a song called Hill and Gully Rider. It's pretty cool to hear a group of students focused and strumming along in unison to a song. We have recently learned the G chord with the hopes of playing along with a pop song of choice before the Easter break.

I would like to say a big THANK YOU to the parents that came with their children to celebrate learning in the music classroom during Student Led Conferences. It was such a joy sharing and making music with you! Wishing you all a lovely Spring 🐳
